4. Roundtable check- in (10 mins)	<ul> <li>Roundtable of introductions.</li> <li>There were no additional items added to the agenda.</li> </ul>	
5. City Nature Challenge (CNC) results (25 mins)	<ul> <li>An update of the CNC results was provided:</li> <li>This was the third year that Darebin, in collaboration with 23 other LGAs, represented Greater Melbourne in the City Nature Challenge.</li> <li>From all councils, Darebin had the most observations (3,133) and most species (832) recorded.</li> <li>The number of participants in Darebin has increased from 37 in the first year to 88 this year.</li> <li>Fun fact: of every thousand individuals who participated worldwide, one was from Darebin.</li> <li>Greater Melbourne ranked in the top 50 out of +500 participating cities around the world.</li> </ul>	Sofia to share the link to the different iNaturalist projects: - City Nature Challenge 2024: Darebin - City Nature Challenge 2024: Greater Melbourne - City Nature Challenge 2024: Global - Biodiversity in Darebin. Sofia to provide updates as required.
	<ul> <li>Discussion: how can we improve the data that we collect?</li> <li>We have limited data on nocturnal wildlife. Some barriers include safety concerns and lack of equipment, but there is a lot of interest from the community.</li> <li>Guided group surveys by Friends Groups would provide a safe environment for nocturnal surveying.</li> <li>Other opportunities: Nangak Tamboree runs twilight tours - could they lend this equipment or support groups outside of the sanctuary? They charge for their services and only lend equipment to be used inside the sanctuary – but it could be further discussed.</li> <li>Darebin CC could develop/share more resources on how to run tours, how to get good quality data, and ethical considerations.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Discussion: in which ways can we promote increased participation?</li> <li>Involving community gardens, retirement villages, schools and bush kinders.</li> <li>Outsourcing beyond Friends Groups - could university students guide more targeted events to their expertise?</li> <li>Think of offering a different experience, for example, speed dating citizen science.</li> <li>The feedback collected will be used to follow-up opportunities to:</li> </ul>	

	<ul> <li>Expand network of collaborators and participants.</li> <li>Fill knowledge gaps and improve quality of data collected.</li> </ul>

Strategy Review - Assessing our current actions for nature (50 min)	<ul> <li>Break (5min)</li> <li>Workshop to start to review actions from multiple strategies and plans and discuss priorities for renewal.</li> <li>The top five-to-seven priorities for our biodiversity were discussed: <ul> <li>Environmental protection/ ESOs</li> <li>Demand for an ESO on Edgars Creek and Central Creek.</li> <li>Expecting large/multiples developments in the coming years</li> <li>Community needs for clarity on this matter - what are the barriers? Could the community help advocate for it or even raise the funds?</li> </ul> </li> <li>Communication <ul> <li>Think about communication metrics to measure the success of the Natural Environment communications.</li> <li>Using the digital space or other opportunities to promote and get people to value the natural space, such as sustainability news, awards, events to talk about nature.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Integration: <ul> <li>Revisit the Human Rights Charter adopted by Darebin City Council - could the number one be the right to a healthy environment?</li> <li>Socialise nature across the whole organization to make sure that everyone is thinking about the environment.</li> <li>Think about it in terms of planetary health - changing the perspective and embedding nature into our business as usual.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	- Members are welcome to submit more feedback via email to Sofia or Marina.
	<ul> <li>4. Prioritisation/identifying the critical conservation areas in Darebin:</li> <li>Revisit the study that led to the Darebin Natural Heritage Strategy and seek to update information (the study is over 10 years old)</li> <li>Use these areas as a focus for action.</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>Keep a focus on First Nations knowledge and involvement.</li> <li>Decolonisation of parks and waterways - for example, starting by changing and incorporating indigenous names.</li> <li>Innovation/new approaches:         <ul> <li>Carbon offsetting by non-for-profiting organisations</li> <li>Private land for conservation (for example, Trust for Nature)</li> </ul> </li> <li>Scientific data collection:         <ul> <li>Ensuring data is accurate and backed by scientific studies and collection methods.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Workshop closing remarks:         <ul> <li>The feedback collected will be used to guide the review of our strategies and to consider next renewal proposals.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
