The official results have been released, and here are some of the highlights:

- A worldwide total of 1.87 million observations of 57,227 species of plants, animals and fungi were documented by 66,394 participants.
- 25 Greater Melbourne councils were involved including Darebin, making it to #20 out of 482 participating cities!
- Darebin almost doubled the number of observations from last year, with a total of 3,544 observations and 761 different species recorded by 71 participants... a big win for biodiversity!
- We had 5 events running in collaboration with community groups (Friends of Edwardes Lake, DCMC, Friends of Darebin Creek and Nangak Tamboree Wildlife Sanctuary).
- Exciting observations in Darebin include: buff-banded rail, long-tailed bombyx moth, eastern banjo frog, tawny frogmouth, and the endangered matted flax-lily.

Coming up next is the <u>Great Southern BioBlitz</u> (24 -27 November

- Cheddar Rd. Revitalisation Project
- Consultation with Melbourne Water allowed for the planting of the eastern side of the Cheddar Rd centre Medium between the shared trail and roadside.
- Works beginning 13th June
- 1.2km stretch of planting creating 7000sqm of vegetation. 3800 sqm is newly created, converted from previous mw zones.
- 10,000 plants to be planted
- 35 indigenous species to be introduced in new beds and infill of previous plantings.
- 4x new park benches and 2x table settings to be installed
- Art work to painted on the path.
- Feedback included suggestions of artwork to incorporate shade, installation of exercise equipment.
- Turtle fence at Edwardes Lake
- Installation of 100m fence at Edwards Lake
- Area identified as a egg laying area

	<ul> <li>Aim to provide sanctuary for turtle species to have a better chance of survival to hatching</li> <li>Fence will limit access to people and dogs primarily but will also deter other pest species like rats and foxes.</li> </ul>
